

When Christ came into the world, he said,


"Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me;

When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.



Vestry Highlights

The vestry met Monday, December 16, convening at Maryann's house for a festive December meeting. Here's what happened:

Vestry members discussed the church's finances and the 2025 budget. Maryann and Finance Committee Chair Duncan Krause presented a draft budget for 2025, outlining various scenarios regarding The Trees in their proposal. A lively discussion ensued, with the committee's and vestry's next steps outlined for the next few weeks.

The vestry nominating committee presented the nominees for the incoming class of vestry members, who we'll vote on during the church's February 2 annual meeting. The vestry looks forward to sharing the nominees with the community at the preliminary annual meeting during all three services on January 19. Vestry nominations from the floor will also be accepted on that day.

The vestry discussed the upcoming Sunday Adult Forum on January 5, when the Harris Property Discernment Committee will present their proposal about the future of The Trees to the church. Join us January 5 at 10 a.m. in the parish hall for conversation, stories, and questions about The Trees.

Flowers for The Beloved Community at The Trees

During Advent, we started sharing our altar flowers with The Beloved Community at The Trees. Every Sunday a member of TBC drops by St. Philip's after the 11 a.m. service and gathers the flowers, which then are rearranged to grace their worship space at The Trees that afternoon and evening.
