
The Third Lesson


The Fourth Lesson




The Sixth Lesson

The Eighth Lesson

Matthew 2:1-11

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. All sit.




The Celebrant proceeds


The Celebrant continues


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all, presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

Celebrant Bread and wine; the gifts of God for the people of God.

Communion is offered in the form of bread and wine. To receive bread only, open your hands, where the priest will place a wafer (gluten-free wafers available).

Wine is offered through sipping from the cup or intinction by the chalice bearer. To drink from the cup, first consume the bread. When the chalice bearer approaches, gently guide the cup to your mouth. For intinction, the chalice bearer will take the bread, dip it in the wine, and place it back in your hand.

If you would like to receive a blessing in place of communion, please come forward to the altar and place your hands across your chest.


Adult Forum resumes January 5:

Guest Preacher the Rev. Phillip Bass

On Sunday, January 5, we'll welcome guest preacher the Rev. Phillip Bass, founding priest of The Beloved Community at The Trees. The Beloved Community is a community dedicated to providing healing ministries outside of a traditional church setting, especially



for those who have experienced religious trauma. (St. Philip's supports The Beloved Community through use of The Trees for their worship services and support groups.)

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

What does it mean to be light in the world? 
