



In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.



He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.



The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

Communion is offered in the form of bread and wine. To receive bread only, open your hands, where the priest will place a wafer (gluten-free wafers available).

Wine is offered through sipping from the cup or intinction by the chalice bearer.

If you would like to receive a blessing in place of communion, please come forward to the altar and place your hands across your chest.

To drink from the cup, first consume the bread. When the chalice bearer approaches, gently guide the cup to your mouth. For intinction, the chalice bearer will take the bread, dip it in the wine, and place it back in your hand.







## Vestry Highlights

The vestry met Monday, Oct. 27. Here's what happened:

**Vestry members voted to add more solar panels** to the parish house roof, taking advantage of federal incentives before they expire. The project, researched extensively by Junior Warden Mike Uhl, will lock in lower, stable energy costs for up to 30 years and is expected to pay for itself over time.

**Shamieka Rhinehart shared how the Outreach Committee will distribute funds** in 2026. She noted a strong mix of long-term partners and new recipients. The vestry discussed ways to promote these organizations and connect our community with their work.

**The vestry voted to approve a new parish auditor:** the firm of Dean Dortan will provide financial audit services for the coming years. Treasurer Marcus Southern expressed gratitude to the vestry and parishioners who helped review proposals.

**The vestry began discussing an aspirational budget** for 2026, referencing our vision statement while setting priorities. Marcus Southern, Mike Uhl, and Finance Committee Chair Duncan Krause guided the vestry through initial budget discussions. The vestry is considering both the positive and negative impacts of our new expenses.


